Lily I'm really interested in how you can grow your own veggies at home.

Well, it's my pleasure to be here Lily. I'm always happy to talk to someone who wants to know about growing veggies. So, I'm gonna show you today how easy it is to put some soil into containers and grow a little bit of stuff yourself at home. And the good thing is you really, you don't need to go out and buy much. You can use all kinds of strange things like a hat, an old boot, an old watering can, a colander from the kitchen, basically anything that will hold some soil will be perfect for growing food. Do you like gardening?

Alright, so I've got a job for you. I've got some lovely potting mix here which is full of all the kinds of things that the plants need to eat, so you want to get your hands right in there, fill that hat up. So then we've got something like this big old leather boot and the last thing that grew out of my boot was my leg. It's still going. But he's an old one and the great thing is it's got all this leather around there so it's gonna hold the soil in there nicely, lots of room for the roots to get down in there. As you can see Lily, adding soil to a boot is a very precise art. And look at that. That to me is about as happy a home for a plant as you could hope for. Look at that, just wants to grow something. We've got our own little veggie farm in a watering can, a hat, a boot, and an old compost bucket. Now, what kind of things do you think we should grow?

Lily Hmm, radish?

Lily I love radishes.

Paul Delicious. Well you're in luck, because I've got some radish seedlings right here, so look at those beauties. So I'll open that up. You want to put your hand out for me? That they'll become the food that we eat. So do you want to just scatter them on the top there? Nice and even over the top. I put a little bit more in there as well. So one important thing to remember Lily is that all this soil needs drainage. You don't want the water pooling in the bottom 'cause that'll make the plants unhappy. But if the water can go through and drain out if there's too much, happy plants! And that's just a matter of drilling some holes in the bottom and maybe even putting just a few rocks in the base would be fine. That'll be more than enough drainage to keep these happy. The best thing about growing your own veggies is that you only pick what you need, especially leafy greens and things like that. So when I pick that I haven't picked the whole lettuce. I've just picked one leaf. You want a taste?

Lily Yeah.

Paul And this is so fresh it's still alive, ohhh. See how crispy and delicious that is? If you've never

gardened before, make sure you start nice and small. That way you can learn the language

of the plants without having too much pressure.
